Chariots for Hope is continually seeking to provide hope to the vulnerable and orphaned children we serve, with the desire that this hope will aid in the transformation of these children in every way. In 2015, we witnessed continuing transformation in the nearly 800 children we are serving. We saw them grow in learning, in spiritual maturity and in emotional well being. Some received medical treatment to begin to transform lifelong disabilities. All experienced a loving home. In this report we're excited to share with you just a handful of these stories that represent countless others.

During 2015, the Machakos region of the Africa Inland Church (AIC), our Kenyan partner, decided to restructure its relationship with the AIC in regard to their area children's homes, and subsequently separated from the AIC-Chariots for Hope partnership. Two homes that we had supported were impacted by this change. While we were disappointed in this result, we are thankful that these two homes continue to be fully sponsored and that we continue to have a prayer connection to these children who have captured our hearts over the past four years.

At Chariots for Hope we are excited about our future and the impact we have on the lives of the nearly 800 children we serve in eight homes across Kenya. We believe the Lord is greatly blessing our work and your gifts. With His continued blessing, we are confident that the children who grow up in our homes will have a significant positive impact in their communities, their nation and the Lord's Kingdom.

Rescuing Moses

When a child's basic needs, like food, clothing and shelter, are not being met, emotional care can easily be passed over. It is critical for their development that our babies and children know they are loved unconditionally.

A baby boy was found a few miles from our Mogogosiek Baby Home. Left abandoned near the gate of someone's home, he was quickly brought to the home. He came with no identity, no name, no birthday. At Mogogosiek he was given the name Moses, and his date of birth was estimated to be the day before. He was so tiny and vulnerable, Now Moses has a home where he is loved!

DECEMBER ADVENTURES

omething new happened for our students and staff this December; they visited each other! In December, the schools in Kenya close for an extended holiday break. We encouraged our homes to schedule activities for the children and make this a special time. They did an amazing job!

Mahiga — Maai Mahiu Visit:

The children of Mahiga visited Maai Mahiu during their break. The staff at these homes planned several big activities for their time together. Children participated in relay races including one where they carried an egg on a spoon! There was also an indoor dance competition with many winners.

Maai Mahiu — Kaptagat Visit

After hosting Mahiga, the children and staff at Maai Mahiu packed up and visited Kaptagat. A highlight of this visit was a nine-mile walk in the forest. As Maai Mahiu is located right off a major highway, these children had never experienced anything like this before! The children also participated in a fashion show. They had a great time helping each other pull together fun outfits to show on the runway.

Kaptagat — Ogada Visit:

Children and staff from Kaptagat travelled four hours to Ogada. After spending some time at the home, they journeyed into Kisumu City to visit the history museum. They also got the chance to see Lake Victoria, the second largest fresh-water lake in the world.

Mulango — Mukaa Visit

A highlight of this visit was soccer matches. The boys took the field first, and the Mukaa boys beat the Mulango boys in a 3-2 victory. The girls took the field next, but unfortunately the match was rained out about five minutes into playing. The rain didn't dampen their spirits, however, as the children continued their fun together indoors.

ENGAGING THE COMMUNITY

Day of the African Child

Celebrated annually on June 16, this day was established by the African Union to honor the courage and memory of those children killed on June 16, 1976 in Soweto, South Africa. Thousands of black school children took to the streets to protest the inferior quality of their education and to demand their right to be taught in their own language. In the two weeks of protest that followed, more than a hundred people were appeal for global solutions to the plight of killed and more than a thousand injured.

The theme of this day each year highlights the rights of children in Africa such as the right to an education and eliminating harmful social and cultural practices for children. This year the discussion was centered on ending early child marriages.

Ogada Children's Home hosted the celebration for their area. Government officials and several other children's homes in the county came to celebrate.

World Orphan Day

Children and staff representing the Maai Mahiu Children's Home presented poems, songs and memory verses at a community celebration for World Orphan Day. World Orphans Day is an international event marked on May 7. Created out of a growing concern for the millions of children who have been orphaned or made vulnerable by HIV and AIDS, among other factors, this orphans and vulnerable children is close to our hearts. The celebrations around the world focus public and media attention on this crisis.

Kaptagat Service Project

In April many children and staff members from our children's homes completed a community service project at the Kaptagat Police Station. They were able to make a difference in their community by picking up trash in the surrounding areas and cleaning up outside the station. The police were very appreciative of the help.








Unaudited results. 2015 audit will be completed in the coming months.
