a life changed

ONE YOUNG MAN'S DETERMINATION

TO SUCCEED AND HIS THANKS FOR THE SPONSOR

WHO MADE IT ALL POSSIBLE

his is what I would say to those who have never seen or met us children. You only hear stories about us but you sacrifice a lot of monies and belongings to keep us here at the children's homes in Kenya. It is not a waste of your money or resources, it is a blessing and a life change to the children. You have changed many children's lives; you have changed our future. You give us a reason to live and a reason to see life in a much different and better way than we could have seen it some few years back when our future was blind. You are a glowing light in the darkness in our lives. I could not be who I am today if it were not for you sponsors, well-wishers, and organizations. My family could not have educated me and brought me up the way a children's home has done through you."

The excerpt above is from a letter written to Chariots for Hope by a young man named Kimanthi who graduated from our program in 2018 after completing his college education. Kimanthi is currently 23 years old.



Kimanthi's story reflects that of so many of our children. He is one of ten children, and his parents struggled to provide food, shelter and clothing for them all. Kimanthi and several of his siblings were sent to live at a local children's home when he was just five years old. The home he lived at was one of many in Kenya that closed their doors in the early 2000's due to lack of funding. That's when Kimanthi moved to our Mukaa Children's Home. He shared that coming to live at our home was a completely different experience. It was the first time he had everything he needed.

For Kimanthi, education was very important but not always easy. When he came to Mukaa Children's Home he was enrolled in fourth grade. He found the classes to be very challenging because he did not have a strong foundation. Kimanthi exhibited such determination and continued to work hard and

press into things that challenged him. This hard work paid off as Kimanthi completed high school and has recently graduated from Moi University with a degree in education and is pursuing a career as a high school math teacher.

Without the help of sponsors and supporters, Kimanthi's life might have looked very different. There is a good chance he would not have finished his education and would be living in survival mode—each day looking for casual work to provide basic food, shelter, and water to sustain him for just that day.

As Kimanthi says in his letter, your gifts and your sacrifices make a difference. They change lives!

more than basic needs

You'll often hear our team say that we're focused on more than just meeting a child's basic needs of food, shelter, and clothing. We're not content to just help them survive until they reach 18, but rather we desire to see their lives changed by investing in their social, emotional, and spiritual health, education and life experiences. Below is a glimpse into a few of the ways our homes expanded the children's horizons.



FIELD TRIP OPENS OPPORTUNITY

A group of children from our Mahiga Children's Home visited the local airport this year. They learned about booking flights, how airports and aircraft operate, and got to see planes land and take off! Children saw opportunities for careers and gained understanding of new things. Will this open a door for a child to pursue a career as a pilot, mechanic, or flight attendant?

CAREER CONVERSATIONS

Our homes receive many visitors each year from within Kenya as well as from the US. One thing we ask of each visitor is to share what they do for employment. We want to continually expand the thinking of our kids as to what their futures hold and the opportunities that are available to them.

HIKING MT. LONGNOT

In November, Maai Mahiu Children's Home hiked Mt. Longonot—an inactive volcano and crater. This expands learning beyond the classroom to broaden how our kids see the world around them.

CARING FOR ANIMALS

Caring for goats, chickens, and livestock is essential knowledge for individuals living in rural Kenya. Our older children work closely with the groundsmen at every home to learn these important life skills.


OFF TO CAMP

ouring into our staff continues to be a critical focus. In November, Bob Feller, president of Chariots for Hope, traveled to Kenya to host our annual leadership meeting. The meeting was attended by 17 of our key leaders including managers, social workers, regional accountants, and our national director and program manager.

Over two and a half days the agendas were full but the time together was invaluable. From casual conversations over a cup of chai to small group discussion and more formal large group meetings, our leaders got the chance to learn, grow, share, and encourage one another.

A FEW KEY TOPICS OF DISCUSSION:

How to make devotional time more impactful— This was a great discussion on how to keep daily devotions engaging, relevant, and gospel-centered for our children.

Education Matters—Home leaders had the opportunity to learn from one another as they shared their struggles and successes in helping their children succeed in their education.



Risks in human trafficking—Because human trafficking is a very real concern in nations like Kenya, it is important that all of our leaders are aware of red flags and understanding strategies that could be employed against children at our homes and in their local communities.

Influence of drugs on teens—Our homes have a lot of teenagers who are growing up and going off to higher education, living away from home for the first time. Our leaders had in-depth discussions on how to teach our teens about the dangers of drug use and standing up to peer pressure when they are exposed to difficult situations.

In addition to the formal group discussion, each home leadership team had time to work on their strategic plan for their home. Each manager spends intentional time working on the home's goals for the coming year by way of projects and initiatives.

Plans are already underway for dedicated trainings for our Social Workers and a retreat for our Dorm Moms in 2019

65:1

While the numbers above could mean many things, would you ever imagine that in Kenya this represents the student-to-teacher ratio in the classroom? In the public schools surrounding several of our homes, this ratio of 65:1 has been the reality. At one of our homes we have even seen classroom ratios of over 100:1.

what is education like in kenya?

Unlike the US, children in Kenya must qualify through national exams to attend high school. Because many children don't attend school consistently before coming to our homes, they begin their education at a disadvantage.

Each of our homes has an onsite tutor who works with our students after school, on weekends, and during school breaks to help with homework and in areas where they struggle.

At Kaptagat and Maai Mahiu many of our primary students (1st- 8th grade) are attending local private schools as their public schools were some of the worst.

Education needs are significant. While we are making progress, raising the bar on education takes resources. We expect to spend \$325,000 on education in 2019. Gifts designated for education go a long way in changing a child's life!




