#### IN THE FACE OF THE UNKNOWN

Like so many, we never could have expected what 2020 brought. However, as we look back, we see numerous blessings and provisions from the Lord.

COVID IN KENYA | Along with the rest of the world, the pandemic brought about significant changes to daily life in Kenya. The country closed its borders, schools, and the majority of public places in March. Unlike developed nations, only a tiny percentage of the population has the ability to work remotely. Significant economic hardship hit Kenya this year. Additionally, cases of COVID continued to rise as the year went on, spreading from the cities into rural communities. With the average citizen having very little access to health care, this was a major concern for many.

Our leadership team took swift action to ensure the safety of our children and staff. This included limited movement outside of the home, added sanitization practices, masking as appropriate, and following local and national regulations. We are so pleased to share that none of our children or staff members contracted the virus. We thank the Lord for his protection.

Trauma Healing Institute, a division of the American Bible Society, created timely and culturally-appropriate resources focusing on COVID-19 that we were able to get to our home leaders. These materials gave insight and instruction around finding quality information, understanding how to take action, and most importantly, pointing back to the truth of God's word in the midst of uncertainty.

COMMUNITY SUPPORT | The communities around our homes came through in amazing ways. During 2020, the homes received \$33,000 in donations of food, supplies, and cash from their local communities. In the case of Mahiga and Mukaa Children's Homes, the donations of food weren't just a few bags of flour. The community donated four to six months' worth of food! At Mahiga Children's Home, the director of a local tea factory even donated a hand washing station.

AT HOME | Just like you, our children and staff stayed home. While this presented many challenges, our Kenyan staff rallied. They used the time together in purposeful, intentional, and creative ways. They ensured the children had activities to fill their time that taught skills, reinforced their education, and poured into them as people.

SCHOOLS CLOSED | The schools in Kenya closed in March and did not broadly reopen until 2021. Not wanting the children to fall behind, we invested in bringing in extra tutors to give more personalized attention to the children and to add creativity to learning. These tutors were made up of community members and alumni.

MORE THAN A TUTOR | For our children, seeing an alumnus like Joseph come back to the home to invest in them has value far beyond the tutoring he provides.





Joseph, who finished college last year, is one of three Mulango Children's Home alumni who traveled back to their former home to help tutor the children when schools were closed due to the pandemic. The kids really enjoyed being taught by their big brothers and sisters!



A truly inventive hand washing station! A water tank with 2 pedals—one for soap, one for water—means hands-free washing.



Food donations to our homes included items such as maize flour, rice, sugar, cooking oil, salt, tea leaves, biscuits and sweets, sanitary items, beans, and bananas.



PLANS FOR THE FUTURE, BUCKSON & CYRUS | Buckson grew up at Mahiga Children's Home and is finishing his training in motorbike mechanics. Motorbikes are a common mode

of transportation in Kenya and are always in need of repair due to the rough roads they travel. In working with this young man, David helped him see an opportunity. By acquiring just a few tools of his own, Buckson could provide his services independently,

#### **GOD PROVIDES!**


In a year where so many organizations struggled, Chariots for Hope was able to meet all the needs of our homes without cutting our programs or services to the homes. Thank you!

A significant portion of our reduced expenses were a result of Kenyan schools being closed, therefore we didn't incur the associated school fees. Not being able to travel and bring supporters over to Kenya also contributed to reductions in both income and expenses.

\*Note: Income in 2018 and 2019 includes \$197,700 and \$143,000 respectively raised as part of initial stage of an education capital campaign. *Campaign was placed on hold for* 2020. *Unaudited results.* 2020 audit will be completed in the coming months.

#### **BUILDING ON A SOLID FOUNDATION**

Over the past six years, a strategic effort was made to develop a strong financial foundation for the long-term health of the organization. Given our commitment to the children in our homes, we know it is wise to build up savings, enabling us to fulfil our mission, even in the most challenging times. 

#### CULTIVATING LASTING CHANGE

Investment comes in many forms. At Chariots for Hope we are dedicated to investing deeply into our children's lives. In order to do this well, we must also invest into our Kenyan staff members, equipping, training, and encouraging them as they live out the gospel in the lives of the children we serve.



These biblically rooted lessons utilize games, activities, stories, and discussions to teach and reinforce important concepts.

#### LIFE SKILLS TRAINING

Investing in a child's future goes beyond the doors of a classroom. We worked with a trusted partner to create a customized Life Skills Training for our homes. Ten essential topics are covered in cultural and appropriate ways. Not only did our homes get to utilize this curriculum while schools were closed, but it will be integrated into our ongoing program for years to come.

#### STAYING CONNECTED

In any given year it's not uncommon for our US staff, board members, and core partners to make 15 trips to Kenya. In 2020, only one trip in February, before the closures, was able to happen. Always looking to enhance our communication abilities, we began testing out a new technology upgrade in early 2020. Little did we know just how important this upgrade would be!

Video calls became a consistent option at all our homes. This transformed the way our US and Kenyan leadership teams have interacted while travel is restricted. While it will never replace the importance of being together in person, we were so incredibly thankful for God's timing in this enhancement.


